

The following accession contains the observations, studies, reports, drafts, recommendations, supporting documentation, and other related materials of the Ellison Commission, which was a group formed to study the criminal justice system in the District of Columbia.

A review of the current holdings of the agency indicates that these are one of a kind records. The only documents that exist providing a review of the procedures, policies, and practices, of the District of Columbia's court system. The documents contained in this accession have real and informational value and are to be maintained as a part of the permanent record. The accession will be maintained at the Record Center facility in Suitland, Md. on a CST status until such time as the D.C. Archivist decides to recall the records for storage in the District's facility.
